HINTS & TIPS FOR SHARING STORIES

Not sure where to start? Here are some simple ways to make your story shine:

- Keep it short and clear—a paragraph and a photo can be powerful.
- Focus on what's unique about your approach.
- Explain why you made the change and how it helped families.
- Include quotes from parents, mentors, or community members for authenticity.
- Use visuals—photos or short videos make stories engaging.

EXAMPLES OF ADJUSTMENTS

Big or small, every change matters. Here are some ideas:

Easy, simple adjustments could include:

- Using Mentor instead of Tutor
- Renaming Role Play to something families connect with
- Calling a Gathering something meaningful in your community.

More complex adaptations may look like:

- Adjusting delivery schedules to fit community rhythms
- Combining face-to-face and digital delivery for remote families
- Embedding cultural practices like yarning circles or bilingual materials
- Partnering with local organisations for joint activities.



WHAT COULD STORIES LOOK LIKE?

Stories can be short and simple or more detailed—whatever works for you:

- Photo and caption (and short paragraph)
- Short story or mini case study.

Writing need not be difficult. Try keeping your submission to 1-2 paragraphs. Use plain language and focus on the positive impact in your program. Remember to add the context, that is, why this matters for your community.

5 Tips to makes a short story a great story?

- 1. Start with the Change What did you adapt (provide examples)
 - Changed Tutor to Mentor for cultural relevance.
 - Replaced Role Play with a term families connect with.
 - · Named gatherings something meaningful locally.
- 2. Explain Why Why was this change needed
 - Did families find the original term confusing or intimidating?
 - Was it important for cultural safety or inclusivity?
- 3. Show the Impact Describe how familes responded
 - Did engagement improve?
 - Did the program feel more welcoming?
- 4. Add Voices Include quotes from families, Tutors/Mentors, or Coordinators.
 - "Families said they felt more comfortable when we used the word 'Mentor' because it sounded less formal."
- 5. Include Media
 - Photos of activities, gatherings, or materials.
 - Short videos or audio clips.
 - Screenshots of adapted resources.

Examples

Story 1: Language Change for Inclusion

"In our community, the word *Tutor* felt too formal and intimidating. We started using *Mentor* instead, and families immediately felt more comfortable. It helped build trust and made the program feel like a partnership."

Story 2: Cultural Adaptation

"Role Play didn't resonate with our families, so we call it < Your Sites Term>. This small change made parents feel less pressured and more supported, and participation increased."

Story 3: Community Connection

"We renamed our gatherings < Your Sites Term> to reflect local traditions. Families said it felt more welcoming and culturally safe, and attendance grew."

"To support remote families, we introduced <Your Sites Term> alongside home visits. This helped parents stay connected and engaged."

"We noticed families preferred evening sessions, so we shifted our schedule. Attendance increased by <X%>, and parents said it was easier to balance work and HIPPY."

Consent & Requirements

Before sharing photos or videos, please make sure everyone is informed and agrees:

- Participants must understand their images and stories will be used on social media and the HIPPY Australia website.
- Use a Photo/Media Consent Form that includes:
 - Purpose of use (social media, website, advocacy)
 - Where it will appear (HIPPY Australia platforms)
 - o Permission for adults and children featured.
- Do not share images without signed consent.
- Avoid including personal details (addresses, phone numbers) in stories.

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
